Notes from Our Service Officer

The House Committee on Veterans' Affairs Subcommittee on Disability Assistance and Memorial Affairs held a legislative hearing to examine nine bipartisan bills aimed at improving Veterans benefits, survivor equity, and transparency within the Department of Veterans Affairs. One bill drawing significant attention was the Susan E. Lucas 9/11 Servicemember Fairness Act, which would extend presumptive service connection to Pentagon personnel who returned to duty following the September 11 attacks but were excluded from current PACT Act presumptions.

Transportation Service, VetRide and partnerships coordinated through VA medical facilities. These programs are designed to reduce missed appointments and improve access to care for veterans who face transportation challenges due to age, disability, distance, or limited local transit options. Transportation assistance is available for eligible veterans traveling to VA health care appointments, including primary care, specialty visits, and approved community

care. Veterans can access these services by contacting their local VA medical center or VA transportation office. Transportation may be provided through volunteer drivers, contracted services, or rideshare.

Currently, in limited situations, VA may pay a portion of a beneficiary's monetary benefits directly to the beneficiary's dependent, referred to as an apportionment. VA has implemented a new ruling that will limit the circumstances in which compensation, pension, and dependency and indemnity compensation (DIC) benefits are apportioned and will stop making need-based apportionments going forward. This change serves to avoid conflicts with awards granted by state family courts. State family courts are usually more familiar with family circumstances and therefore better suited to make decisions regarding financial matters. An apportionment is when VA pays a portion of monetary benefits directly to dependents, rather than to the Veteran or beneficiary.

DAR Salutes our own Leslie Belz



Dr. Sara Hoefler from the William P. Duval Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution attended our February Post meeting to make a very special presentation to Post 112 member, Leslie Belz. Leslie was one of the first married women with children to join the Women's Army Corp in 1974 as she began her military service. Leslie trained as a welder and later transferred to the regular Army and was the first woman to be assigned to the 46th Engineer Battalion at Ft. Rucker, AL.

Leslie was presented with the Women in American History Award, joining other women like Amelia Earhart, Eleanor Roosevelt, and Rosa Parks as recipients of this very prestigious award.

The Chaplain's Prayers : Billy Dover



I have been carrying a tremendous amount of emotional and spiritual weight, and the way I am reflecting on it shows a depth of humility that many people never reach. When someone is surrounded by illness, loss, and the responsibility of caring for others—as I have been with firefighters, veterans, and Legion members—it's natural to feel stretched thin. It's also natural to feel that tension between wanting to trust God fully and realizing you're still human, still learning, still growing.

What stands out to me is that I am not just talking about mercy in the abstract. You're wrestling with it in the real world—during disagreements, during exhaustion, during grief. That's where mercy becomes costly, and therefore meaningful.

A few thoughts that might help you see your own journey more clearly:

1. **Mercy isn't a feeling—it's a choice.** You've already shown mercy in countless ways: visiting the sick, supporting grieving families, honoring the fallen, and showing up even when you're tired. Those are acts of mercy, even if you don't always feel spiritually "strong" in the moment.
2. **Mercy grows where honesty lives.** You're honest about your struggle. That honesty is not a failure of faith—it's the soil where deeper faith takes root. Many people never admit they need God's help to be merciful. You're already ahead of the curve.
3. **Disagreements are the hardest place to show mercy.** You're right that this is where most of us stumble. Mercy in conflict doesn't mean pretending the disagreement doesn't matter. It means choosing patience over pride, listening over reacting, and remembering the relationship is more important than the argument. That's not weakness; that's spiritual discipline.

James 2:13 For he shall have judgment without mercy, that hath shewed no mercy; and mercy rejoiceth against judgement.

We are designed to meet people where they are, without judgment, and to respond with patience even when someone is frustrated or hurting. In that sense, I try to embody the spirit of mercy—steadiness, compassion, and a willingness to understand rather than condemn.

But the heart of my question is about whether *you* are growing in mercy. You're aware of your shortcomings, you're seeking God's guidance, and you're actively trying to love people better. That's the path Christ describes.

If you want to strengthen mercy in disagreements, here's a simple practice:

Pause before responding. Even a few seconds can change everything.

Ask yourself: "What would mercy look like right now?"

Choose the smallest merciful action available. A softer tone. A slower response. A willingness to let the other person finish speaking. Mercy doesn't have to be dramatic to be real.

What kinds of disagreements challenge you the most—because that's often where the deepest growth happens.

Prayer: Thank you God for giving us the verses dealing with your COMMANDMENT, and showing mercy. Give us wisdom to realize that we need to have the Holy Spirit guide us in every moment of our lives. We give thanks for your guidance to our Country, State and local leaders. We also pray for your protection on all Service personnel, the first responders and especially their families. This we ask in the name of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit. AMEN

2026 School Medals—Bob Colbert



We are just getting started with the School Medals. If you are not familiar with the program, the Post presents school medals to graduating 5th graders in the 5 or 6 elementary schools that we service as well as the two High Schools in our

area. We also present medals to the ROTC and NJROTC units at Lake Howell High School, Winter Park High School and the Army ROTC at the University of Central Florida.

After the elementary schools make their recommendations,

we present a medal to an outstanding boy and girl for their Citizenship. For the ROTC programs, we present a medal for Academic Excellence and a medal for Military Excellence. These students are recommended by the ROTC instructors.

The Post prepares the medals and certificates to be awarded. We have a representative from the Post present the medals at a pre-determined time, usually at an awards ceremony at the schools. The same holds true for the ROTC programs.

Our challenge arises when we have multiple schools holding their ceremonies on the same date and time. In the past, it has sometimes been a race from one school to another. It

would help the Post (and the volunteer presenters) if we had a few more people helping out. The Auxiliary and the Post work together to make these presentations as both organizations cover essentially the same schools. If you are interested in helping out, please let me know. The presentations for elementary schools are usually at the end of May during the morning and the dates are set by the school.

The presentations are fun to do, and we have a script that you can use. The ROTC presentations as well as the High School presentations (they are different) are set by the schools and are often in the evening. Again, if you are able to help out, please let me know.

Elections for 2026-2027—Officers Duties

We are coming up on our election of officers! The election will be held in May with the final nominations closing in April. The nominating committee will present its candidates and then open the floor to other nominations. This is the time for anyone else who would like to run for office. The installation of Officers will be held at the July meeting.

So, are you interested in running for office? The positions and a summary of their duties are:

Commander – Presides at the meetings and represents the Post at District meetings and other Post, District and Department functions. The Commander is also responsible for insuring that there are chairs for the committees and programs that the Post has chosen to follow are populated.

1st Vice Commander – Our First Vice Commander is responsible for presiding over the meetings in the absence of the Commander. He or she is also the “DeFacto” Membership Chair. The First Vice also researches and coordinates the guest speakers at the meetings with the Commander. The 1st Vice also would be the key person in arranging for the members who do not come to the Post very often are checked on by phone or in person.

2nd Vice Commander – Our Second Vice Commander is responsible for the physical Post. The 2nd Vice works with the Commander to maintain the property and make recommendations for changes or improvements and works closely with the Adjutant to coordinate activities at the Post. If there is a cost involved outside of the budget, the Second Vice presents the item to the Post’s Executive Board. Additional volunteers may be recruited to assist in any of the projects needed to maintain or improve the Post.

Chaplain – The Chaplain is responsible for the

opening and closing prayers at all formal meetings. He or she is also expected to check on and, when possible, visit those members who have fallen ill. The Chaplain is also expected to take the lead (chair) in the annual Four Chaplains Ceremony and “Post Everlasting” ceremonies that the Post performs twice a year. In the event of the passing of a member, the Chaplain would be expected to assist the family with the military or VA portions of the arrangements where possible or necessary.

Finance Officer – The Finance Officer is responsible for all deposits and withdrawals involving the Post’s Finances. The Finance Officer prepares a monthly financial report to be presented to the General Membership at the monthly meetings and is also responsible for making sure that all the State and Federal requirements are met, including filing the IRS Form 990 and the State Corporation renewal as well as any State Sales Taxes that need to be filed. The Treasurer should be familiar with QuickBooks as that is the current bookkeeping system in use.

Historian – This person should be able to attend most of the Post’s functions and meetings and take pictures of significant events. The Historian also maintains the annual “Scrap Book.” The Historian can work with the newsletter editor in exchanging photos and stories.

Sergeant At Arms – The Sergeant at Arms ensures that members sign in for meetings and that they are current members of the Post. Members with expired membership cards may be excluded from voting at the meeting. The Sergeant At Arms also handles the POW/MIA empty chair ceremony and leads us in the Pledge of Allegiance.
